Director's Dish

We often share information in our newsletters about nutrition and our efforts to distribute healthy food directly to communities who may be under resourced.

The events recognized typically serve hundreds of people. Today, I'd like to share a story with you about two people – a young mother and her 11-month-old daughter.

I was having a rough day and went to the front desk to feed my sweet tooth. A young mother with her baby daughter was looking for food. Her grandfather was in the hospital, and she was feeding other family members with what little food she had. She was in a caretaker position but not able to fully care for herself and her child. She asked for a list of pantries that would accept her even though she did not live in

the county. The baby began to cry, and her mother explained she hadn't been able to feed her because they had been in the hospital with her grandfather. The baby was teething and distressed.

As you can imagine, our staff flew into action. Within minutes, operations staff had gathered canned goods, fresh fruits and vegetables, and protein for this young family. Our front staff person ran to the breakroom to get water and granola bars. She gave the young mother a list of pantries she could visit, as well as the link to our Find Food page on our website.

I walked away from this experience, and I was a little embarrassed about feeling I was having a rough day. I remembered that we need to focus on what is truly important – caring for each other.


